Andrew James Williams (1906-1970)

When Andrew James Williams was born on April 25, 1906, in Belfast, Ireland, his father, Andrew, was 47 and his mother, Jane, was 44.

The 1911 Census of Ireland shows the Williams family at 37 Humber Street, Belfast Ireland. Parents and 4 siblings at home. Andrew is 16 years old.

There was no census taken in Northern Ireland in 1921 and apparently the 1926 census was destroyed, so we have no records available to determine where Andrew was or what he did during that period.

The next we find Andrew is his emigration to Canada in 1927. He departed Belfast 19 Mar 1927 aboard the Cunard liner Carmania. The ship's list shows him as a farm worker, age 21, from Bliany Lurgan, intending to make Canada as his permanent residence. Canadian Immigration Service paperwork shows his arrival in Halifax 26 Mar. The only additional information on this list was that his father, Mr. J Williams lives at Bleary, Lugan, Co Armagh. Bliany does not seem to exist but Bleary is a small village about 2 km south of Lurgan, so it is suspect that the ship's list is a typographical error. Ironically Andrew's father died a month later.

Andrew went West to Alberta, no doubt because his sister Annie was in Edmonton and brother John near Czar. When the stock markets crashed in 1929, brother Robert moved West to find work in Lethbridge.

He married Marjory Irene Agnew on September 3, 1930 in Calgary. His home was listed as Red Deer Alberta.

The bride was given away by her father, and looked charming in an ensemble of powder blue georgette with blue silk mohair hat to match. She was attended by her sister, Miss Beatrice Agnew. who was becomingly gowned in Nile green georgette with hat to match. The bridegroom was supported by Mr. J. Martin, of Calgary

Both bride and groom are wellknown in Red Deer, Mr. Williams being engaged here as provincial cream grader.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams left for a motor trip to Lethbridge and other points south. The bride received many nice and useful presents, and their many friends wish them much happiness in their new life. Mr. and Mrs. Williams will reside in
